Evacuation and lockdown drills

As required by Work, Health and Safety regulations, the school holds both evacuation and lockdown drills. The evacuation procedure occurs when there is a need to move out of the school buildings because of possible emergencies such as a fire, gas leak, or explosion. When the evacuation siren sounds. students under the direction of classroom teachers move via the safest route to one of our school's designated Evacuation Assembly Areas



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which are our top oval or front lawn. Everyone must remain secure in the Evacuation Assembly Area until the situation has been declared safe by the Principal.

Another possible emergency procedure is called Lockdown. Lockdown is when everyone in the school must remain secure in rooms because it may not be safe to go outside. This procedure occurs when there is a potentially dangerous or suspicious person or group of people on or around the school grounds. Evervone must remain secure in rooms until the situation has been declared safe by the Principal.

During these emergency procedures it is very important that students do not communicate electronically with any other person

either inside or outside the school. Parents should be aware that there will be no access to the school grounds and that information will be restricted until the emergency situation has been resolved. It is important that parents or other members of the school community do not arrive at the school in order to pick up their child or attempt to contact their child by telephone or text message, unless contacted by the Principal or Police to do so. Parents should also be aware that, depending on the type of emergency, their arrival at school may place themselves in danger, and hinder the work of emergency personnel.

Please be aware that we practise several of these procedures each year and they are a normal part of providing a safe and secure environment for our students and staff.

Quad Resurfacing Works We are thrilled with the outcome of the resurfacing works carried out in the guad at the end of Term 2 and during the school holidays. Over 1,000 square metres of concrete were poured to replace uneven surfaces and brick walls were removed and replaced with fencing to open the area up. Plans are underway to erect a COLA-like structure over the raised section of the quad to provide shelter from the sun and rain. Additional undercover seating will also be provided.

DEC Attendance and Exemption Policy 2015

The DEC has released an updated policy on student attendance and exemption from schooling that is to be followed by all schools this year. There are some significant changes to past practice and some aspects will affect our families:

- 1. Exemptions from school can no longer be given for family holidays. Absences for this reason will be recorded as "leave".
- 2. If a student is absent from school for an "appointment", proof that the student has attended will be required within 7 school days. For example, if a student has an appointment during school time, this will be recorded as an unjustified absence until a medical certificate or other proof of attendance is provided to the school.

Tell Them From Me Student Survey

survey is conducted online and will typically take less than 30 minutes to complete. It will be administered during school hours between 9 October and 14 October. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary.

ABCN Interact 2015

Interact is a series of workshops designed for recently arrived, high school-aged migrants and refugees whose first language is not English.

The idea of Interact is to support these students in gaining the cultural and vocational literacy they need to participate in Australian life. The emphasis is on socialisation, communication and on building relationships.

Students learn to sustain adult conversations in English with a positive role model outside their immediate community.

The target group is students aged 14-19. They are placed in groups with mentors. 4 groups were established with 1-2 mentors per group.

Mrs Welch together with Mrs Cheeseman chose, in consultation with staff, students who would embark on these interact sessions. 20 students from the IEC and high school have been chosen.

The sessions began with an initial meeting here at Evans on August 19, where the mentors met staff and students and were shown around the school.

The subsequent 4 sessions will take place in September and October at CSR headquarters, North Ryde. Students will be accompanied by Mrs Tolhurst and travel by minibus to North Ryde.

There will also be a session at the CSR brickworks in Schofields. There we will be taken on a tour of the factory and walk around a 'model' home built with CSR products.

The students who participated in the first session on Wed 2 September were excellent role models for our school and a positive experience was gained by all. They were enthusiastic and participated wholeheartedly. I look forward to the subsequent sessions.

Families in Cultural Transition (FICT)

FICT workshops have been held in the Common Room every Tuesday since 11 August. The aim of this workshop is to assist parents from refugee backgrounds to meet and exchange ideas with people from their community. The workshops enable parents to deal with changes in family relationships and improve relationships with their children.

Our targeted group consists of parents with an Arabic speaking background from the IEC and High School. The workshops are conducted by two trained facilitators from South Sydney Area Health Services. Over a ten week course. facilitators will address the following modules that will help parents to settle in the new modules The environment. are: NSW. in Schooling Money, Support Systems, Trauma and Healing, Families, Youth, Children and Employment. The sessions will conclude with an excursion on 13 October.

Over the last four weeks, we have seen an increasing number of participants as they are finding the workshops meaningful and practical. With continued support from the community, we intend to hold similar workshops with other targeted groups in the future.
